Peter Richter - A Short Biography

Born in Vienna in 1963, I am living in this place since then.

During my time at highschool, I took a close look at printing techniques like etching and woodcut, always accompanied by a particular interest in visual composition. My self-taught approach to photography was initially inflamed by Andreas Feiningers's book "Total Photography". In the late 1970s I conducted courses on analog black and white photography with a focus on darkroom techniques. In 1980 I had the opportunity to show some of my photographs at an exhibition.

The development of digital photography offered me new possibilities in image processing and printing as well. This work is partly art and partly science and therefore requires informed and critical supporting. A couple of workshops conducted by the Viennese nature photographer Georg Popp deepened my analysis of landscape photography and allowed me to immerse in digital techniques. An exhibition as a guest at the Popp-Hackner Photo Gallery in Vienna in 2013 made it possible to present some of my work in this field.

Alongside my interest in visual composition I have constantly paid attention to image analysis. As a member of the Photographic Society of America I have acquired the qualification as a judge for national photo contests.

Many times just the details in the landscape are the focal point in my images. The term "Intimate Landscapes" has been coined in particular by Eliot Porter. This careful look at structures, patterns, colors and tonal values as well as abstract qualities often is the center of attention in my work.

Apart from my occupation as neurologist in a clinic in Vienna, I am frequently seeking the way to experience nature, in the close surroundings of Vienna as well as in the Austrian Alps and other European regions, especially Brittany, Normandy, Northern Spain, Portugal, Scotland and the Northern Sea. In my photographic work I try to keep these memories and make them accessible for others.
