
A note from the Editor - by Christiane Menelas

Hello my friends,

I'm back from an amazing trip to Alaska and Suki is back from an awesome trip to El Salvador, so in this issue we will have a double feature in our travel section.

Besides sharing our fantastic travel stories I would also like to share some struggles, and maybe you have run into the same problem? I wanted to calibrate my lenses before my trip, so I would have tack sharp images. But boy did I struggle to get this right. I kept getting error messages on my camera when trying to calibrate my lenses. Has anybody else run into this problem?

Well I talked to Ed Zukowski at our last meeting, and he recommended a software called FoCal, by Reikan. I watched a couple of YouTube videos on it, and it looks like an amazing program. Let me know if you have any experiences with this. I will definitely report back in the next issue, after trying out this program.





This past week I had the privilege to visit El Salvador with Fuller Center for Housing (https://fullercenter.org), a non-profit organization dedicated to providing homes to eradicate poverty housing by promoting partnerships with individuals and community groups to build and rehabilitate homes for people in need. Their faith-driven mission centers on "knowing that after we've done all we can do, the Lord will help finish the job — something that requires us to stretch beyond our rational reach."

Since this was not a photo travel event, but a home building project, I will not provide photo tips as I spent most of my days undertaking tasks I never in my wildest dreams thought I would be doing.

First, a little bit about El Salvador... It's a beautiful country situated in Central America between Guatemala and Honduras. The currency is the Salvadorian Colón, but everyone is happy to take U.S. greenbacks! It seems that everywhere you look in El Salvador it is green even though we were there during the dry season. The food is delicious, but don't drink the water — not even to brush your teeth!

Apaneca is a 2.5-hour drive from San Salvador, the capital, and is the coolest part of the country at 1,477 meters above sea level, making it ideal for growing coffee. Fuller Center has already built over 1,000 homes in the region and while we were there five homes were being built simultaneously.

What were the fantastic skills I picked up during my week in Apaneca? For starters, I learned how to cut drywall, hang drywall, and sand drywall (ok, I already knew how to do this). Then I graduated to filling mortar between bricks that were laid by someone who knew what he was doing. In my spare time, I carried bricks to job sites, shoveled dirt to fill-in the foundation, and lots of sweeping (job sites get very messy). My favorite job was saved for last – painting the interior and exterior of the home we drywalled.

At the conclusion of the week, we dedicated a completed home by turning over keys to the new owner. It was a moving celebration that had nearly everyone in tears. Fuller House provided pizza for the entire community — and everyone came out for pizza!

The volunteers... It was an amazing group of 17 people from all parts of the country and all walks of life — Seattle, Atlanta, Minnesota, Oregon, Texas, Ottawa, Petrolia... We had a restaurateur, respiratory therapist, software developer, poultry farmer, critical care nurse, pediatrician, lawyer, magazine editor, accountant, and salesman. They were a fun group of people who loved to laugh between shoveling dirt and moving bricks. I would go on any build project with them again!

P.S. People asked me if I felt safe in El Salvador — the unequivocal answer is YES. They have a president (currently in his second term having won 83% of the vote) who is making every effort to turn the country around and seems to be making remarkable progress; the homicide rate has dropped 98% in nine years, making it one of the safest countries in Latin America.

Alaska is simply amazing to explore, I will never get tired of it. This was my fourth time visiting, and I cannot wait to go back. This visit was all about a festival called Fur Rondy. Fur Rondy, also known as the Fur Rendezvous festival, originated in Anchorage, Alaska in 1935 when local resident Vern Johnson organized a three-day winter sports tournament timed to coincide with the return of miners and trappers to town with their furs, essentially creating a celebration around the fur trade which was a major industry in the area at the time. The event was meant to bring the community together during the long Alaskan winter. Well this year was the 90th anniversary of Fur Rondy with sporting events, and entertainment lasting two weeks. Of course it's impossible to participate in every single event, but I sure tried. The absolute highlight of my trip was the amateur photo contest that I had entered back in December. Pictures had to have been taken in Alaska during 2024, and there were many categories, so I thought why not... Well to my absolute surprise and honor I walked away with 1st place in the black and white flower category, as well as best in show in the black and white overall category. Two of my photos got an honorary mention, and three others got chosen for exhibit. So out of my 7 entries, 6 placed something. To say this was a proud moment would be an understatement!



Followed by running with the Reindeer. It's just like running with the bulls, except nobody gets hurt.









One thing's for sure – Alaskans know how to have fun!



Photo Scavenger Hunt


