It will tell you the exact distance your target needs to be placed, based on which lens you are using. The information it provides is very helpful, and also very plentiful. If you're a tech geek, you will love it. I was really only interested in basic information, but you can do a deep dive, and it will provide you with charts and measurements galore. It will also tell you by what percentage your lens focus is off. One of my lenses was 99% good, which was nice to know. Once done with the calibration, it programs the information for that lens into your camera. I do recommend watching the YouTube videos if you're interested. This is only for DSLR cameras, and not for mirrorless. Hope that helps.

BIRDING PHOTOGRAPHY EXPEDITION TO COSTA RICA By Sandy Gilbert

At the end of February, Sharlana Dillard, Suzanne Daunt, Sue Eley and I traveled to Costa Rica for a birding photography adventure. We flew into San Jose, where we were joined by Sue's friend, Nick Bucek. We arrived a day early (to ensure that we didn't get delayed by a late ice storm as has happened before), which gave us a free day to explore old San Jose. We spent the day wandering around the colonial plaza and buying souvenirs at the very large and busy mercado.

Early the next morning, on March 1st, our tour guide, Andrey Madrigal Torres, and intrepid driver, Antonio, met us at the lodge to officially start our adventure. During the next 10 days, we traveled south from temperate San Jose to the very chilly highlands, then north all the way to the Caribbean coastal plain, and back again to middle

elevations. Along the way, we stayed at four unique locations, from rustic lodges in the countryside to a colonial-style hotel in the city of San Ramon. Each lodge had its own charm, but they all had one thing in common — great food!

The main reason for staying in the different locations was to photograph the birds that were common to each region. We usually had a "target bird" each day. For example, in the highlands, we were up at 4:30 am two mornings in search of the Resplendent

Quetzal, Costa Rica's most famous (and sometimes elusive) bird. There were hummingbirds that were specific to certain regions, and we took a couple of hikes up very steep trails to find the Three-wattled Bellbird and an Ornate Hawk-Eagle's nest. We hiked, stopped on the side of the road, photographed owls in a city park, sat in bird blinds and took a boat trip on the San Carlos River. In all, we saw over 90 different species of birds, including 16 species of hummingbirds, 9 species of tanagers, 4 species of owls, as well as Macaws, Toucans, Parrots, Kingfishers, Warblers, shore birds and more.

Andrey and Antonio were amazing at finding birds and other wild creatures in obscure places and generally helping us get the shots.

Although photographing the birds was the purpose of the trip, what made it so great was the camaraderie and fun times that we had as a group. From the amazing scenery, to cocktails on a porch overlooking the San Carlos river, or to finding a baby monkey in the trees, I believe that I can speak for the group when I say that we all came home with







What camera do you like to shoot with now?


Nikon D850 with Nikkor 200-500mm with a 1.4 TC-14E teleconverter.

Were you born and raised in Texas, or did you move here?







The DIY Photographer

Doing It Yourself doesn't mean you can't ever buy cool new photo gear! However, there may be times when you want to try a new lighting tool out before investing in a ready-made version. Maybe you are just starting out and want to achieve great lighting but don't yet have the budget for expensive gear. You don't have to spend a lot to have high-quality lighting! Knowing how to rig your own gear up has benefits too; you learn to be resourceful. Even when you have the best gear available, there will be times when it will break or you need to modify it in some way. Your DIY skills will pay off regardless of your gear budget or resources.

Window Light Scrim

The large scrim is one of the most helpful lighting modifiers you can own. It works excellent outside to diffuse or reflect the sun and can be used indoors with a flash fired or as a fill reflector. The large size means terrific, soft, window-like light. It can be used for babies or groups of 4-5 adults. Make a couple of these, and there are a few lighting challenges you can't tackle!

Building the DIY Scrim

Supplies Needed:

- •3 10' pieces of 3.4" PVC pipe 480 psi schedule 40 wall thickness (\$6.50)
- •4 90 degree elbow joints 3/4" (\$1.75)
- •2 T fittings 3/4" (\$1.00)
- •white ripstop nylon 60" x 2 yards. (\$10)
- •elastic cording 1/4" x 20' (\$1.80)
- •elastic strap 1" wide x 2'

Tools Needed:

- •small hacksaw
- •sharpie marker pen
- •tape measure

- •instant glue for PVC
- sewing machine

Instructions:

1. Measure, mark, and cut 3 pieces from one of the 10' PVC sections:

- 2. Repeat on a second 10' PVC pipe section. 3. From the 3rd 10' length of PVC, cut a piece 36-1/2". 4. Layout the pieces with corners and T-fittings. 5. Glue the T-fittings as shown. Keep it flat on the floor so the angles are correct. Keeping the center bar un-glued allows it to be removed if not needed.
- 6. Optionally, you can mark with a Sharpie on the T-fittings where the non-glued pieces will go so you remember which sections to pull apart for packing.
- 7. Run the elastic cording around and through the perimeter pieces. Pull it to create some tension and tie a knot. Once you have the tension just right, cut off any extra cording past the knot. The cording helps keep your pieces together prior to assembly but should not be relied on to hold the frame intact. The pressure fitting of the pipes to the joints handles this.
- 8. Lay your assembled frame on your nylon cloth and cut the fabric to fit.
- 9. Stitch a piece of elastic strap across each corner.
